Mooshigan State trustees reject open presidency

Despite persistent calls from campus activists, Mooshigan State University trustees say they don't plan to reveal the identity of the person hired as MSU's president in July.

"We wanted to attract the most qualified candidates, and that includes candidates who told their families they were running out for a pack of cigarettes and never came back. It includes candidates who've had trouble with organized crime syndicates," said board Chair

Deanna Buy-Rum.

"I can't tell you if the current president falls into one of those categories, of course, but someone who did simply wouldn't be able to lead the university if they were constantly hounded by questions like, 'Mommy, when are you com-

ing home?' or 'Where did you bury Carmine's nephew?'"

Some members of the campus community contend that knowing the identity of the person who has been leading the university for the past several months is essential to evaluating his or her job

performance.

"You should be able to pick the university's president out of a line-up. No, it's not listed as a best practice because literally no one disputes it. I can't believe I'm explaining this," said Antje Gorton-Pelgar, a Mooshigan State professor.

The university did say in a press release that the president is "uniquely qualified to chart a path forward for Mooshigan State and to help the university carry out its mission of transforming lives, communities, and society" and that he or she will earn \$850,000 a year. ■

LANDSLIDE MARK WINS BY TWO VOTES

New Marijuana Laws Effecting Drivers

The Michigan State Police are secretly revising their method for determining if people are driving while high on marijuana.

Filet du Moi
